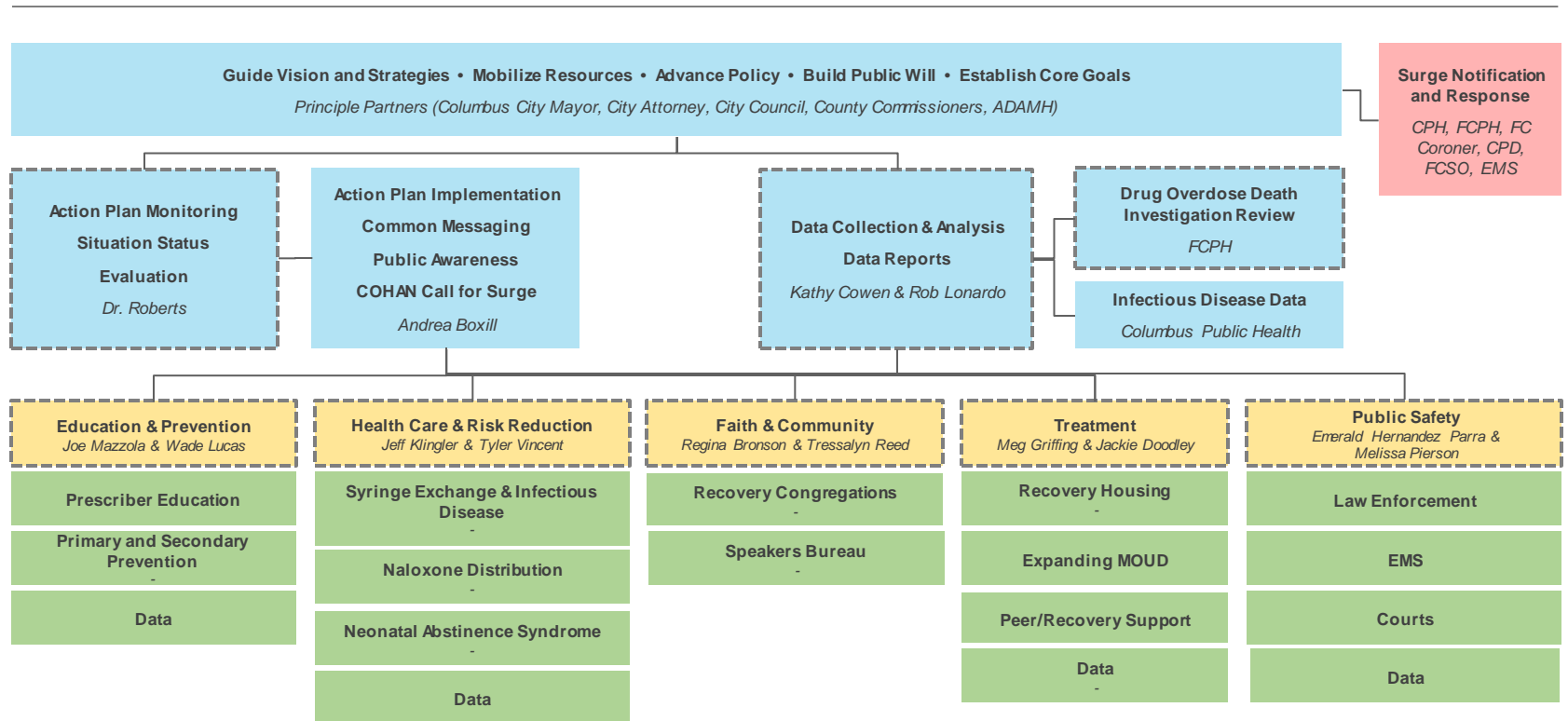

Data to Inform and Direct

- OFR: Drug Overdose Death Investigation
 - City and County Public Health Departments, Coroner, DEA, Hospital EDs, Crisis Stabilization Centers, Ohio Board of Pharmacy, Poison Control, Sheriff's Department
- Overdose Detection Mapping Application
 - EMS, Coroner, Epi-center
- People Who Use Drugs Interviews
 - Outreach Teams
- State Interdiction Efforts
 - Ohio Narcotics Intelligence Center Monthly Meeting

Example of OFR Findings

Coroner's Office Updates

- 64 deaths in April 2020 that are certain overdose deaths (ODMAP shows 20 more deaths from the Coroner's Office, but they are still suspected overdose deaths)
- All deaths in the cases had fentanyl in their preliminary toxicology screens
- COVID-19 isolation is also increasing alcohol use

Characteristics of 10 Decedents From DODI

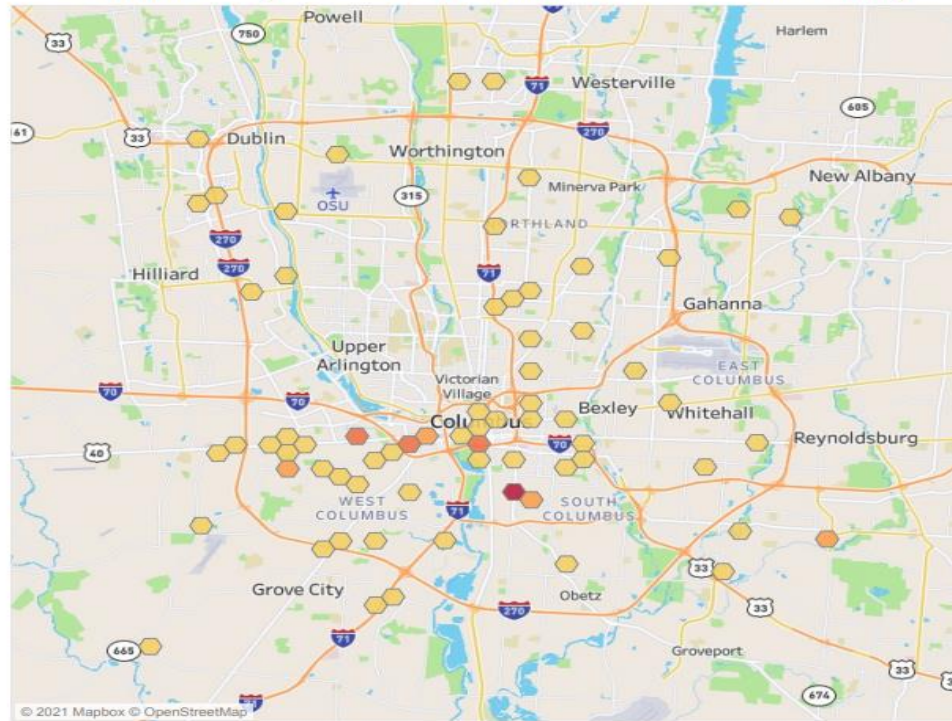
- The majority of cases lacked criminal history and involvement in any of our systems
- 5 cases had high school diplomas or higher education
- 5 cases worked in the restaurant/food industry
- At least 5 cases sought some form of recovery and showed motivation to stop using drugs
- 3 cases domestic violence—both perpetrators and victims
- 3 have mental health issues—suicide attempts
- Alcohol use disorder

Challenges

- COVID-19 stay-at-home order
 - Depression, boredom, isolation, risk taking, lack of natural supports
- Better messaging needed that cocaine and meth are also risks for exposure to fentanyl
 - Cocaine has become extremely expensive, so there has been a lot of cutting with fentanyl. The price has not changed significantly in Columbus, but DEA reports that it is seeing the price increase in other cities
- Cannot differentiate drugs that are “white powder” at the scene: distribute more fentanyl test strips

Action Plan

- Epidemiology report on top overdose zip codes
 - Identify the communities that we need to target
- Social marketing campaign from the C&FCAP
 - Define our target populations within those communities and use imagery and language specific to those groups
- Real-time intervention
 - Pop-up naloxone events with bundled services (hygiene kits, masks, sanitizer, WIC services, and sexual health)
- Jail population reduction
 - Distribute naloxone to those who score high on the Clinical Opiate Withdrawal Scale (COWS) before release
 - Create videos that can be aired in holding cells and at children's services

What You Need to Know About Fentanyl Overdose

If someone is experiencing a fentanyl overdose, they might:

- ▶ Vomit
- ▶ Be awake but unable to talk
- ▶ Have skin that is clammy, pale, blue or ashen in color
- ▶ Experience shallow or slow breathing or completely stop breathing
- ▶ Go limp or lose consciousness

Sometimes it can be difficult to tell if a person is just very high, or experiencing a fentanyl overdose. If you're having a hard time telling the difference, it's best to treat the situation like an overdose. Call **911**, and use **naloxone** (Narcan) – a medication that can help reverse an overdose – if you have it.

Going to Use? Make Sure You Have:

- ▶ Fentanyl tests strips – To check your product for fentanyl
- ▶ Naloxone – To help reverse an overdose
- ▶ A friend – To call 911 in case you overdose

Get Help.

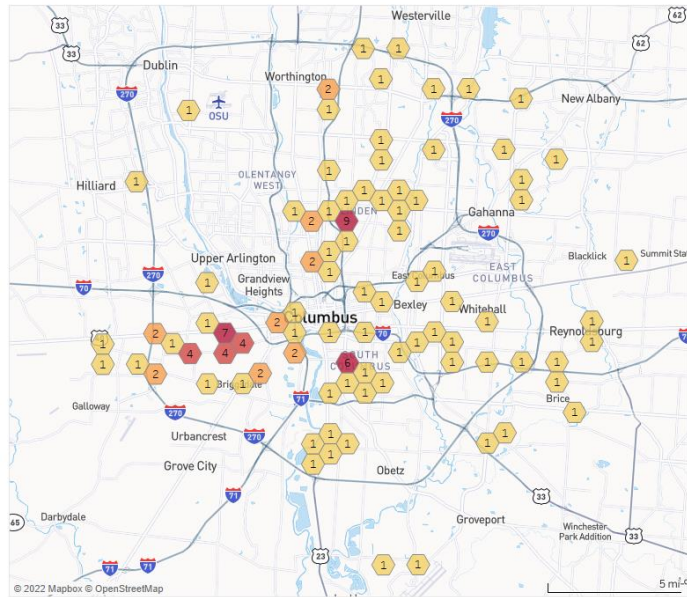

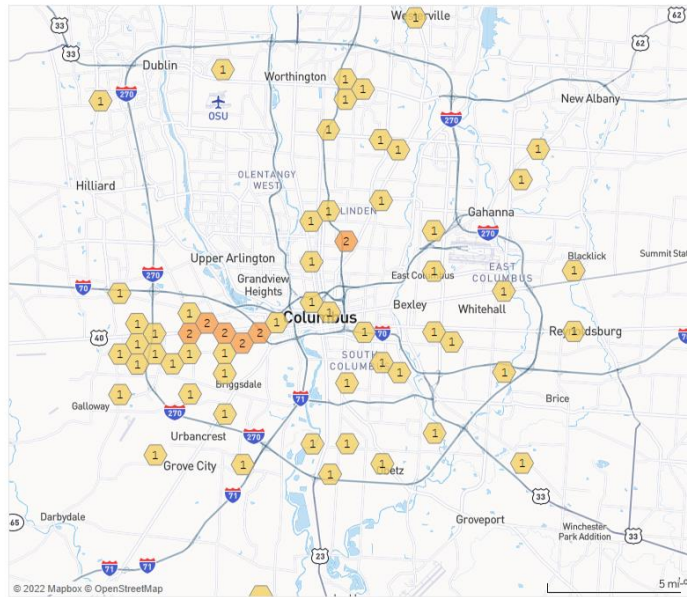
