- Empowerment and inclusion






Before intentionally including PWLE, an OFR must have:

- Preparation for Stakeholder Engagements
- Tracking & Feedback of Recommendations

OFR Participants With Lived Experience

Individuals in Recovery

- Person who formerly used drugs
- Family member of a person who has recovered from drug use
- Certified Peer Recovery Specialists/Peer Coaches
 - Not all "Peers" are peers
 - Mental health (MH), co-occurring disorder (COD), substance use disorder (SUD)

Individuals in Early/Very Early Phases of Recovery

- Persons who currently use drugs
- Family member of a person who uses drugs

Active Lived Experience and Harm Reduction (HR) Participants

- Persons who currently use drugs
- Persons who engage in HR Support Programs; e.g., syringe services programs (SSPs)

Considerations of This Stakeholder Group

- Prepare all participants
 - Trauma Hx is not always a barrier
 - Strength, catharsis, belonging
- NOK process for the bereaved

- Emotional support
- Safe environment
- Debriefing sessions
- Ongoing support
- Vetting process

Reasons to Develop a Vetting Process



- Emotional preparedness
- Confidentiality and trust
- Objectivity and impartiality
- Representativeness

Addressing Inappropriate Comments



- Establish clear guidelines (ground rules)
- Training and awareness
- Pre-screening of materials
- Open dialogue
- Active facilitation
- Frame comments as learning opportunities
- Emphasize goal
- Confidential reporting mechanism
- Address individual concerns privately
- Continuous improvement

- · Facilitate virtual meetings and workshops




OFR Mentor Site Opportunities
