## **Family Treatment Court**

- Family Treatment Court is a voluntary specialty court that uses a family-centered, multidisciplinary approach to serve families with substance use disorders who are involved in the child welfare system in Palm Beach County. It is the mission of Family Treatment Court to provide families with the support and services they need to stabilize the family in a safe and expeditious manner.
- Goals are to
  - decrease safety risk to the children,
  - reunite families before or around 12 months,
  - reduce the probabilities of the children being removed from the parents in the future, and
  - help the parents address their substance use.



## Background

- Family Treatment Court in Palm Beach County began in 2010
- 2019 COSSUP Grant
  - Peer Support
  - Child Parent Psychotherapy Assessments and Collateral
  - Motivational Interviewing Training for the Family Treatment Court Team
    - Initial Team Training
    - Follow-up Trainings

- Peer Support without Recovery Experience
- Communication

- Limited Resources for Substance Use

## **Marion County Courts**

- Marion County boasts 11 Problem Solving Courts, with hopes to continue to grow
- In addition to the Adult Felony Drug Court that was established in 1997, we have expanded to include:
  - Juvenile Treatment Court
  - Felony Prison Diversion Drug Court
  - Adult Diversion Drug Court with Felony and Misdemeanor tracks
  - Teen Court
  - Juvenile Civil Citation
  - Mental Health Court
  - Veteran's Treatment Court
  - Family Treatment Court (Formerly known as Dependency Drug Court)
  - DUI Court, and
  - Early Childhood Court
- Collectively, these programs have served more than 3000 participants since the program's inception.



## **Dependency Programs**

- The Marion County Family Treatment Court is a partnership between...
  - o The Courts
  - o Department of Children and Families
  - o Guardian Ad Litem Program
  - o Kids Central. Inc.
  - $\circ$  The Centers
  - Defense attorneys
  - Other social service programs.
- The Family Treatment Court is designed to get involved in the lives of parents where drug use has been determined with court monitoring, and other resources needed to ensure permanent lifestyle change and hopefully assist in the reunification of parents with their children.



## **Early Childhood Court**

- Early Childhood Court (ECC) works with families of children in the 0–5-year age range who are involved in Dependency Court.
- The program features access to a Community Coordinator who assists in:
  - Coordinating the right services
  - Increased visits between parents and their children
  - Specialized family therapy
  - Monthly team meetings to assist parents with services and celebrate accomplishments
- There are more infants and toddlers in foster care than any other age group. Helping babies now can result in longer healthier lives. Many parents of children in the Dependency System were also in the system as children themselves. Research has shown that the cycle can be broken with early intervention and family support.



## Challenges

- Stigma
- Funding
- Provider Availability

## **Evidence Based Interventions**

- Cognitive Behavioral Therapy
- Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
- Circle of Security Parenting (participants in the combined program of FTC/ECC, voluntary for FTC participants)
- Peer Coaching
- Recovery Housing
- Group Sessions (Out-patient & Intensive Outpatient)
- Residential Treatment
- Frequent Court dates with General Magistrate



## Data from COSSUP's reach to participants

- Participants served since inception: 70
- Overview of 2023:
  - Participants served: 37 with 83 children
  - Successful completions: 9
  - MAT usage: 2
  - Residential: 1
  - Recovery Housing: 2
  - Child Recidivism: 0

- Overview of 2024 through 6/11/24:
  - Participants served: 22 with 38 children
  - Successful completions: 1
  - MAT usage: 5
  - Residential: 3
  - Recovery Housing: 0
  - Child Recidivism: 0



## Sustainability



## Affordability

- For the participants:
  - Offering a sliding scale/Accepting Medicaid
  - Assistance with finding affordable insurance coverage
  - Providers offering program rates versus individual rates
- For the program:
  - Continual push for more dollars
    - State, County, and Grants
  - Financial Integrity



#### **Partnerships**

- Establishing relationships with Quality Community Resources
  - Touring facilities & asking questions
  - Community conversations about programs needs and wants
  - · Holding professional staffing with providers and community-wide stakeholders' meetings
  - Key partnerships: SUD providers, Peer supports, Sober livings, Residential treatment, housing, employment, emergency shelters, first responders, food pantries, churches
  - Team trainings and team building
  - Transparency and open communication between program and stakeholders



## Visibility

- Being *visible* in our community
- Outreach
  - Attending community events and meetings
  - Operating vendor booths
  - Joining our participants in pro-social activities
- Social media presence
- Presence
  - Jail visits
  - Attending shelter hearings
  - Active taskforce members


- Participant Overview
